A representative from MHA will be with us in the lobby at each performance to provide resources for those who are interested. Although twelve years have passed since the Sandy Hook Elementary School massacre, the tragedy of that day continues to live with us as we bear witness to ongoing gun violence across our nation.

We also welcome audiences to engage with us and further explore the themes of the play through our Geva Insights on Tuesday, April 23 and Mondays at Geva on April 29. You will find more information about these events on pages 14 and 15, as well as information about our Centering Indigenous Voices engagement events later in June on page 35.

I am grateful to be here in Rochester to share in this production of Newtown at the theatre I have been invited to lead alongside Elizabeth Williamson. I look forward to engaging in dialogue about the theatrical experiences that inspire you as I learn and grow in my new community.

SOMETHING LIKE HOPE: AN INTERVIEW WITH PLAYWRIGHT, DAN O'BRIEN

Playwright Dan O'Brien returns to Geva Theatre with the World Premiere of his impactful new play, *Newtown*. He discussed his work and history with the theatre with Fiona Kyle, the Dramaturg for the production.

In addition to being a playwright, you are also a highly lauded poet. How does poetry influence your playwriting?

I suppose I write poems like a playwright and I write plays like a poet. When I write a play I care about the language, the specificity and rhythm and sound, but the dialogue has to of course feel natural in the mouths of the characters, has to be their attempts to communicate imperfectly in the moment with other characters. When I write a poem I'll half-think about how a monologue works onstage: the question or need that drives the language, and the change in thought or emotion that lets me know when a poem is finished, has meaning. Sometimes I write poems in character, or in the voice of a "persona," as poets like to say. Sometimes I tell stories with my poems. Writing poetry is an intensely introspective preoccupation. Maybe writing poetry helps me imagine the interior lives of my characters. These characters may never have the opportunity to deliver their private, subtextual poems to an audience – thankfully so! – but if I get to know them deeply, then hopefully my audience will too.

You often explore trauma in your writing, yet I am always left with a feeling of hope after I've read or seen your work. Can you speak to the relationship between trauma and healing, and how that manifests in your writing?

Writing has always been for me an attempt to transform pain into something like hope. I started writing in adolescence, not long after my older brother tried to kill himself – an event I witnessed. I grew up with a burden of secrecy: my brother's suffering, and the emotional and verbal abuse in my family, was never to be divulged. Perhaps unsurprisingly, I developed obsessive-compulsive disorder, and I found that writing – and writing as honestly as I could about my childhood – saved me; saved me emotionally, psychologically, and saved me because writing led me toward literature and the theatre where I found friends, love, purpose. I've needed desperately to write during other periods of trauma in my life: when I was disowned by my parents in my early thirties, and when my wife and I were both treated for cancer in 2015-16. Trauma happens to everybody and if we're lucky art can help. And one doesn't have to be an artist to help and be helped; one has to express the truth and begin to heal.

Your play, *Newtown*, is inspired by the shooting that occurred on December 14, 2012 at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut and you've written other plays that are based on real events, such as *The Ballad of George Zimmerman* and *The Body of an American*. How to do you approach writing about real events?

Early in my career I wrote a lot of historical plays, and when I write nonfictional plays that take place in the modern era I think of them similarly: I want to get it right; I want to be accurate, in terms of the facts, and responsible when I take some poetic license. I'm drawn to true stories that nevertheless contain unknown or unknowable gaps, as is the case with Newtown. This play imagines two scenarios that certainly didn't take place as I've depicted them: the play's Part One imagines a mother's one-sided conversation with her disturbed son: Part Two imagines a meeting between a mother and father of a child killed at Sandy Hook, and the shooter's father. (This second scene derives in part from Alissa Parker's memoir An Unseen Angel, in which Parker briefly describes the meeting she and her husband had with Peter Lanza five weeks after the Sandy Hook shooting.) The fictional element is crucial with this play: while writing, it seemed morally imperative that I imagine myself as each of these characters in order to more fully engage with what happened at Sandy Hook, push through my fear and denial, and reckon with some profound questions about myself and our culture.

What is your history with this play?

Ten years ago I was commissioned to write a play about the history of guns in the U.S. The shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary was so recent that it didn't seem to qualify as a historical subject. Then my research for this commission was interrupted by my previously mentioned cancer experience, and in the meantime there were more school shooting, and mass shootings so many that Sandy Hook seemed to recede into the national subconscious. With time it was clearer to me that Sandy Hook was one particularly shocking horror in an ongoing cycle of horrific violence. By the time I began to research this play in earnest, and to write its early drafts. Sandy Hook had become American history, and its story seemed to have a lot to say about where we were, where we are, and where we're going as a society.

Can you share how being a father has influenced the writing of *Newtown*?

I completed a first draft of the play when my daughter was in kindergarten, and I've been workshopping it and revising it in the years since. She's my only child, and her experience with Active Shooter Drills has made this a very personal play to write. Personal but not unique, as we are all living with the trauma of mass shootings, all over the country, in and out of schools. I have felt a certain urgency as a parent, wanting to ask many of the questions that the characters in this play ask, in search of answers that might help create a safer world for our children. In the script I have dedicated Newtown to "the children," by which I mean the children killed at Sandy Hook, but also the children growing up today.

You have a long history of working with Elizabeth Williamson, Geva's Artistic Director and the Director of Newtown. Can you talk about the projects you've worked on together and how those experiences shape your working relationship as playwright and director?

I'm extremely fortunate to have known and worked with Elizabeth Williamson for over a decade. She directed an early workshop of The Body of an American at Pioneer Theatre Company in Salt Lake City, then helped guide that play toward its off-Broadway premiere at the Cherry Lane Theatre in 2016, as co-produced by Primary Stages and Hartford Stage, where she was the Associate Artistic Director/Director of New Play Development. Elizabeth has directed and developed several of my plays, at various venues over the years, always giving me help and encouragement. She's one of the smartest, kindest theatre artists I know: patient, empathetic, keenly perceptive. She is both an innovator and a storyteller at once. She believes that plays can do many things, as do I, but that one crucial thing a play can do is challenge the artists, and by extension the audience, especially when the subject of the play requires it.

You made your Geva debut in 2002 with *Key West* on the Fielding Stage and returned in 2009 with the World Premiere for *The House in Hydesville* on the Wilson Stage: what is it like for you coming back to Geva with another World Premiere?

When I learned that Elizabeth would be the new Artistic Director at Geva I was thrilled, because I love both Elizabeth and the theatre, and it seems like a good match: my experience of Geva audiences is that they're supportive of new work that takes risks. When I learned that *Newtown* would premiere at Geva – I just felt lucky. I've always felt an affinity for Rochester, its culture, and its political and spiritual history. When I first came here in 2002 I had an uncanny feeling of familiarity with the place. Premiering *Newtown* here feels like a kind of homecoming, and I'm grateful.



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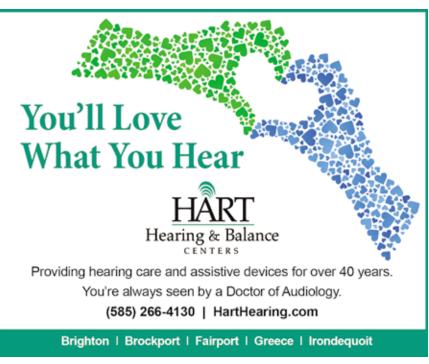

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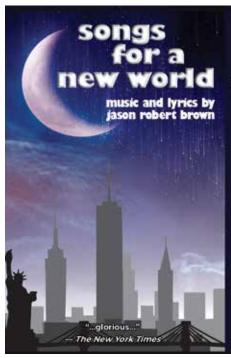

Geva Theatre is a not-for-profit theatre company dedicated to creating and producing singular theatre productions and programs that serve the Rochester region and beyond, by illuminating the fullness of our many human experiences.

Founded in 1972 by William Selden and Cynthia Mason Selden, Geva was originally housed in the Rochester Business Institute building on South Clinton Avenue. In 1982, Geva purchased and converted its current space – formerly a NYS Arsenal designed by noted Rochester architect Andrew J Warner and built in 1868 – and opened its new home at the Richard Pine Theatre in March 1985. Geva operates two venues – the 516-seat Elaine P. Wilson Stage and the 180-seat Ron & Donna Fielding Stage.

As one of the country's leading theatre companies and a member of the national League of Resident Theatres, Geva produces a varied contemporary repertoire from musicals to world premieres celebrating the rich tapestry of our diverse community. We draw upon the talents of some of the country's top actors, directors, designers, and writers who are shaping the American Theatre scene.

Geva's Education Department serves thousands of students annually through student matinees. in-school workshops, the acclaimed Summer Academy training program, and other programs. Geva's New Play Development Programming offers new and established writers a nurturing environment from which to take their work to the next level. Geva has presented approximately 400 play readings and workshops since its inception. Nearly 70 Geva-developed plays have had subsequent productions around the country. 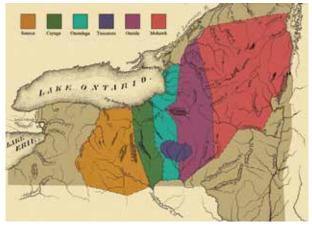

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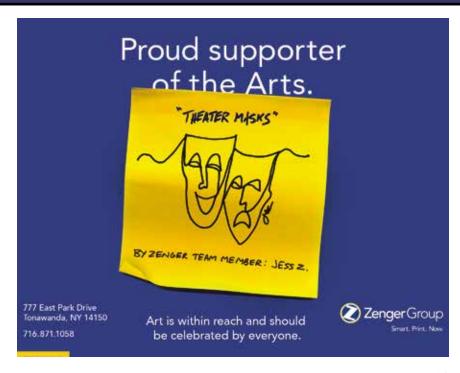

The Mush Hole weaves through the traumatic memories of two generations of Survivors. Visceral performances by an all-Indigenous cast, cinematic imagery and musical score, catapult audiences into the bricks and mortar of the school. Created from Survivors testimonials, it is a story about hope and finding light in dark places.

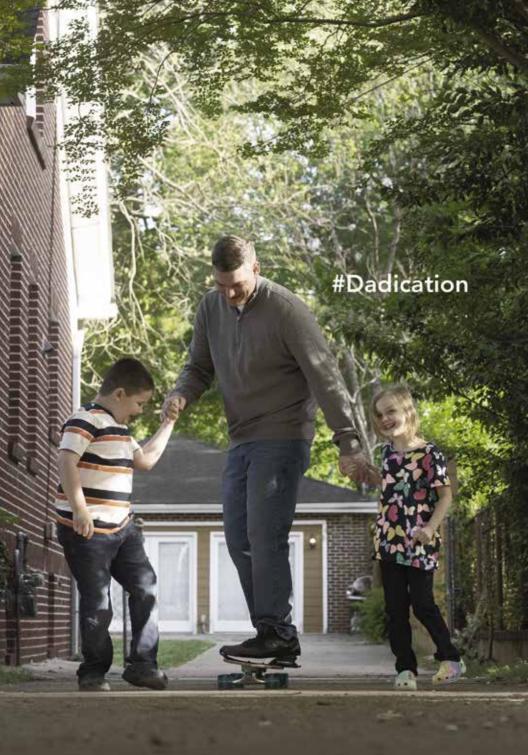


















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
