

Geva Theatre celebrates August Wilson with his autobiographical one-actor play *How I Learned What I Learned* On stage October 15 - December 1

Rochester, N.Y. — Geva Theatre continues its 52nd season with August Wilson's *How I Learned What I Learned* on the Fielding Stage from October 15 - December 1. From Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright August Wilson comes this autobiographical one-actor play chronicling Wilson's life as a Black artist in the Hill District in Pittsburgh. Through stories about his first jobs, first loves, and experiences with racism, audiences go deep into the life of one of the most celebrated writers of the 20th century, from his roots to the completion of his history-making American Century Cycle. "Over the course of the first few months I was in Rochester, as I met with people around town, one thing that kept coming up was what a highlight August Wilson's Century Cycle of plays had been for many here in Rochester (Geva was one of a handful of regional theatres to share the full cycle with their audiences, especially in "decade" order!)," said Artistic Director Elizabeth Williamson. "With that in mind, our Curation Team was thrilled to bring *How I Learned What I Learned* to Geva this season, and we couldn't be happier to have director taneisha duggan and actor Stephen Conrad Moore here to bring it to life!"

The company is thrilled to return to the work of one of America's greatest playwrights in the intimate setting of the Fielding Stage. Geva has presented all of Wilson's Century Cycle, having first produced his play *Fences* in 1986. Wilson's work was last seen on Geva's stages in 2011 when the company presented *Radio Golf* and a reading of *King Hedley II*.

"Our production of *How I Learned What I Learned* is a memory play. To me, it serves as an epilogue of sorts to August's 10-play cycle. It gives us a look back through the eyes of a man who gave us some of the American Theater's most consequential plays and through his memories we get a peek into the tender, hilarious, and sometimes outrageous parts of an icon," shared Director taneisha duggan.

The Creative Team:

Director **taneisha duggan** (all pronouns) is a director and producer whose projects tend toward provocative new works and interpretations of the classics. She is propelled by the belief that the culture we present in our stories, is the society we become. The Cast of How I Learned What I Learned:

Starring in this production, Geva welcomes **Stephen Conrad Moore** (he/him) to the Fielding Stage. Mr. Moore was fortunate to witness August Wilson in motion while he was a graduate student at The Yale School of Drama and understudied a role in the original production of Mr. Wilson's last play, *Radio Golf* at The Yale Repertory Theatre. He is honored to be here and share the words of Mr. Wilson. Mr. Moore has appeared on television shows like *Empire, The Path, The Good Fight,* and the series finale of *Better Call Saul* (to name a few). He recently completed 5 seasons of *The Bold Type* as Oliver Grayson, the fashion editor of Scarlet Magazine. He has appeared on numerous theatrical stages in New York City and across the US (such as The Vineyard, American Theatre Company, Philadelphia Theatre Company, Shakespeare Theatre in DC, Yale Rep, The Guthrie, The McCarter Theatre Center; and has originated leading roles in plays by Thomas Bradshaw, Ellen McLaughlin, and Colman Domingo, amongst others. Most recently, he made his Broadway debut in *Uncle Vanya* at Lincoln Center. Mr. Moore is a graduate of the University of Missouri – Kansas City and The Yale School of Drama.

Rochester-local **David A. Shakes** will be understudying Mr. Moore and has been in multiple productions at Geva Theatre including *Two Trains Running, Fences, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, A Raisin in the Sun*, and *Member of the Wedding*, and *To Kill a Mockingbird*. He was presented with Geva's Essie Calhoun Award for Diversity in the Arts and the City of Rochester's Key to the City for his community contributions. A longtime Rochester resident, Mr. Shakes has appeared with Blackfriars, RAPA, JCC CenterStage, Downstairs Cabaret Theatre, Shipping Dock, Rochester Community Players and the Avenue Black Box as actor/guest artist, director and producer. He was founder of the Village Theatre and founding member of the Spirit House Movers and Players, a touring company under the direction of Amiri Baraka. Mr. Shakes studied at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, Empire State College (BS) and Syracuse University (MSW). He is a much sought after historic interpreter and a retired RCSD social worker. Currently, he is artistic director of the North Star Players.
