



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

# A Legacy of Shadows: The Literary Lineage Behind *The Woman in Black*

Ghost stories have captivated readers and theatre-goers for centuries, drawing them into darkened rooms, lonely houses, and landscapes that hover between reality and the supernatural. From the windswept ruins of Gothic novels to the intimate, domestic terrors of Victorian ghost stories, these narrative forms rely on suggestion and suspense to evoke fear. When author Susan Hill first wrote the novel *The Woman in Black*, she consciously continued this tradition, blending motifs from Gothic Horror, Victorian ghost-story sensibilities, and contemporary narrative techniques to craft a tale that has endured across mediums. Stephen Mallatratt's adaptation for the stage added yet another essential layer: the uniquely theatrical alchemy of shared imagination, placing the production you're about to see within a long lineage of hauntings shaped not only by literature, but by the very act of witnessing a ghost story unfold before your very eyes.

## The Gothic Tradition and Horror

The roots of *The Woman in Black* lie in the Gothic tradition, a literary movement that emerged in the late eighteenth century. The term "Gothic" originally came from the medieval architectural style of castles and abbeys, structures that by the eighteenth century were associated with grandeur, decay, and a morally ambiguous past. Horace Walpole's *The Castle of Otranto* (1764) is widely acknowledged as the first Gothic novel, followed by other early works such as Ann Radcliffe's *The Mysteries of Udolpho* (1794). These novels laid the foundation for a Gothic tradition that would branch into many subgenres, one of which was Gothic Horror.

"The castle of Udolpho rose majestically upon the top of a hill, a grey and venerable structure, with many a dark and winding avenue, and towers and turrets that seemed to pierce the clouds."

Gothic Horror is typically characterized by a heightened moral or psychological struggle against supernatural forces, set amidst remote environments such as crumbling castles, desolate abbeys, or wild moors. Storms, fog, darkness, and decay intensify the emotional stakes, emphasizing the terror that arises when human reason confronts inexplicable events. The distance from the everyday that these locations evoke also produces the uncanny: a sensation in which the familiar suddenly feels unsettling or threatening. This combination of atmosphere, moral struggle, and supernatural presence became emblematic of Gothic Horror.

By the Victorian era, these Gothic foundations had matured into a form well suited to a society experiencing rapid transformation, setting the stage for the intimate and psychologically attuned ghost stories that would come to define the period.

## PROGRAM FEATURE

### Victorian Ghost Stories

Ghost stories were enormously popular in Victorian culture, appearing in parlors, periodicals, and social gatherings. They reflected a society grappling with rapid change and fascinated by the unseen. Widespread mortality, particularly among children, made themes of loss and the afterlife intensely resonant, while scientific and technological advances, such as the telegraph, created both wonder and unease. Spiritualism and séances thrived, offering imaginative ways to connect with the dead and turning the supernatural into a topic of both serious curiosity and public spectacle.

By the mid-19th century, ghost stories were a common form of entertainment. Charles Dickens exemplifies this trend: *A Christmas Carol* became a cultural touchstone, celebrated not only for its story but for its role in the tradition of sharing ghost tales on Christmas Eve. The rise of magazines and periodicals publishing short ghost stories created new opportunities for writers, particularly women, to reach wide audiences. Their stories often explored the pressures and anxieties of domestic life and used supernatural events as a lens through which to examine grief, social limitation, or psychological strain.

Victorian ghost stories retained the Gothic's use of suspense and unsettling atmosphere, but they shifted the focus from distant castles and wild landscapes to ordinary homes and familiar streets. By situating the uncanny in everyday spaces, the stories made terror intimate and immediate, emphasizing that the extraordinary could intrude upon the ordinary.

### Susan Hill and *The Woman in Black* in Adaptation

Fast forward to the early 1980s, when author Susan Hill set out to write a "classic ghost story." She began with a list, drawn directly from the traditions that preceded her:


"I made a list of ingredients:

A ghost—not a monster or a thing from outer space but the ghost of a human who was once alive and is known to have died, but whose recognisable form re-appears or occasionally is not seen but heard, or possibly even smelled.

The Haunted House... usually isolated.

Weather... atmospheric weather conditions—fog, mist, snow, and of course moonlit darkness on clear nights.

A sceptic. A narrator or central character who begins as a sceptic or plain disbeliever and scoffer who is gradually converted by what he or she sees and experiences of ghostly presences."

## PROGRAM FEATURE

All of these elements animate *The Woman in Black*. Eel Marsh House, cut off by a tidal causeway and surrounded by marshes, embodies the threatening isolation typical of Gothic horror. Fog, sea-mist, and eerie sounds heighten suspense, suggesting the natural world itself is unsettled. And the titular Woman in Black reflects the Victorian ghost-story tradition: her haunting rooted in domestic grief and unresolved injustice.

Hill structures the novel around Arthur Kipps' determination that writing down the experiences he witnessed is the only way to exorcise his ghosts, and it is this act that forms the text of the novel. Because the story comes to us through Kipps-as-narrator, looking back on a past he once refused to believe, Hill highlights how storytelling can obscure as much as it reveals.

Stephen Mallatratt's 1987 stage adaptation pushes this tension between fact and fiction even further. Using a play-within-a-play structure, the production positions the audience as witnesses to Kipps recounting his story. The haunting is now unfolding inside the theatre itself, as Kipps and the Actor attempt to recreate the past and "lay the ghost to rest" through performance.

As you sit in the theatre tonight, listening for the creak of a floorboard or the whisper of a ghostly presence, you are participating in this centuries-long tradition. Just as Victorian audiences gathered to witness ghostly tales, you too are enacting a ritual of imagination, suspense, and shared experience: a haunting lineage of fear and fascination.

directed in 1987, has been running in London for over thirty years, and has completed 12 UK tours. Directing, and occasionally performing in this play, has taken him, among other places, to Japan, USA, India, Singapore, Hong Kong, Australia and New Zealand. He now directs much more than he acts, varying his choice of play and venue as much as possible. The last two productions he directed were *Stray Dogs*, a new play about Stalin and the Russian poet Anna Akhmatova at the Park Theatre in London, and a new version of *The Woman in Black* at McKittrick's Hotel in New York, where it won Best Revival in the Off-Broadway Alliance Awards.

**ANTHONY EDEN (Tour Director)** Antony is an award-winning actor, director and producer from the UK. He started acting professionally at nine years old and, since then, he has worked in theatre predominantly as an actor, but also as a stage manager, fight director, lighting designer, director and producer. The first play he staged, at the age of 15, was an amateur production of *The Woman in Black*, in which he also played the part of the Actor, after seeing the show in the West End. Since then he has played the part of the young actor in Robin Herford's production over 1400 times in London, on UK tours, in America and Asia. In 2016 Antony felt honoured to be asked by Robin to become Associate Director on the play that kickstarted his love of theatre as a teenager, and has since overseen productions for Robin in USA, Australia and Japan. 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## ABOUT GEVA THEATRE



Geva Theatre is a not-for-profit theatre company dedicated to creating and producing singular theatre productions and programs that serve the Rochester region and beyond, by illuminating the fullness of our many human experiences.

Founded in 1972 by William Selden and Cynthia Mason Selden, Geva was originally housed in the Rochester Business Institute building on South Clinton Avenue. In 1982, Geva purchased and converted its current space – formerly a NYS Arsenal designed by noted Rochester architect Andrew J Warner and built in 1868 – and opened its new home at the Richard Pine Theatre in March 1985. Geva operates two venues – the 516-seat Elaine P. Wilson Stage, and the 180-seat Ron & Donna Fielding Stage.

As one of the country's leading theatre companies and a member of the national League of Resident Theatres, Geva produces a varied contemporary repertoire from musicals to world premieres celebrating the rich tapestry of our diverse community. We draw upon the talents of some of the country's top actors, directors, designers, and writers who are shaping the American Theatre scene.

Geva's Education Department serves thousands of students annually through student matinees, in-school workshops, the acclaimed Summer Academy training program, and other programs. Geva's New Play Development Programming offers new and established writers a nurturing environment from which to take their work to the next level. Geva has presented approximately 400 play readings and workshops since its inception. Nearly 70 Geva-developed plays have had subsequent productions around the country. Geva's Literary Department produces multifaceted programs such as *Geva Insights* that deepen the appreciation of the work on our stages, provide opportunities for regional dialogues, and help fulfill Geva's anti-racism commitments through collaborative programming.

An active member of the Rochester community, Geva offers a multitude of opportunities for our audience and community members to engage with live theatre and the country's best artists. Since the breadth of Geva's programming cannot be sustained on ticket sales alone, this contribution to the region's cultural, social and economic vitality is recognized by grants and charitable contributions from federal, state and local government agencies, national and local foundations, and businesses and individuals from throughout the region.



# ACKNOWLEDGING THE LAND

A land acknowledgement creates a more accurate picture of the history of the lands and waterways we call home and pays respect to the Indigenous People who have stewarded them from time immemorial. By honoring this truth, we begin this effort to acknowledge what has been purposefully buried.

There are 567 federally recognized Indian Nations (variously called tribes, nations, bands, pueblos, communities and Native villages) in the United States. Additionally, there are tribes located throughout the United States who are recognized by their respective state governments.

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
